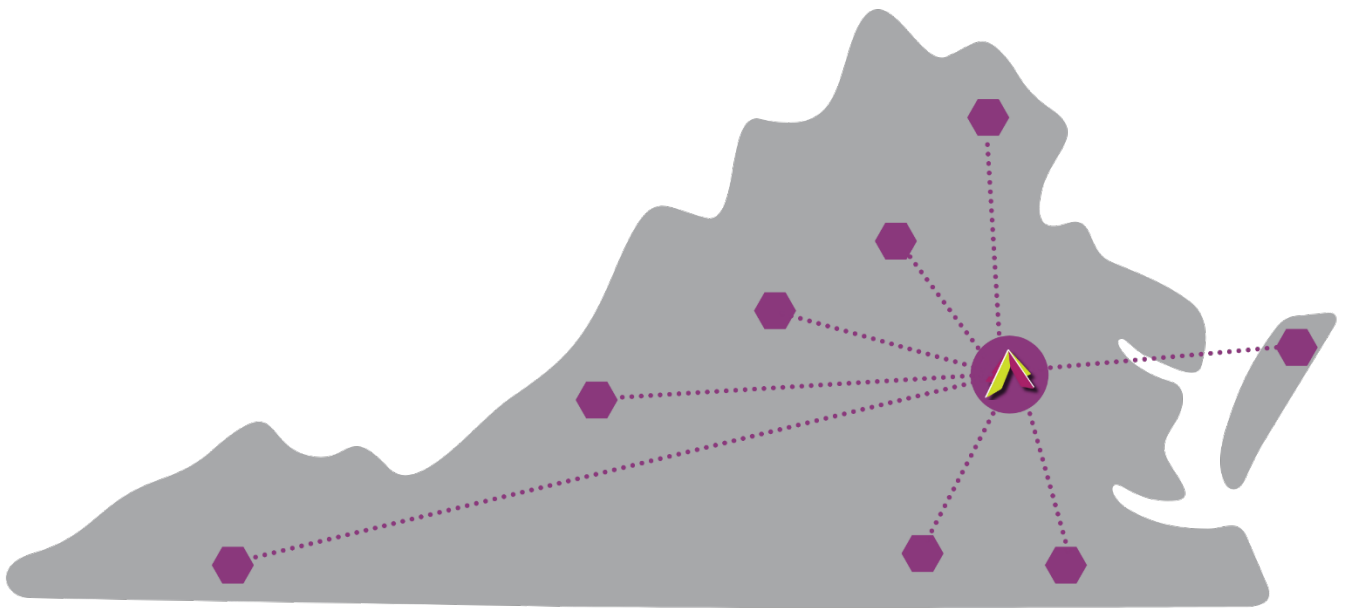

WHAT IS PROJECT ECHO?

Project ECHO is an international model for training and peer-to-peer learning that was originally developed at the University of New Mexico by doctors and other medical providers. The model has since been adapted in a number of settings for a variety of professionals. Project ECHO uses Zoom, the teleconferencing software, to connect professionals from multiple locations to present challenging cases to each other, gather feedback and recommendations, and to discuss new developments and best practices. The structure of each ECHO Clinic is an integral component of the ECHO model.

This isn't another passive webinar! We use Zoom so that you can see each other and communicate in real-time. Come prepared to ask questions, make recommendations, and connect with staff and administrators from campuses across Virginia.

ECHO TERMINOLOGY

Hub	A hub is a regional center where a multidisciplinary team for a TeleECHO Clinic is located. The Action Alliance is Virginia's hub for topics related to sexual and intimate partner violence prevention and peer education programs. Members of the hub team coordinate TeleECHO Clinics.
Spoke	Spokes are all of the community partner sites where individuals/ teams of individuals participate in TeleECHO Clinics. Colleges, universities, and community colleges across Virginia are our spokes.
TeleECHO Clinic	TeleECHO Clinics, sometimes called Clinics, are individual sessions of ECHO. Clinics are delivered on the Zoom Meeting platform.
Case Presentation	Case presentations are the heart of the TeleECHO Clinic. Cases are presented by individuals at spoke sites so that they can collect feedback and recommendations from other Clinic participants. Case presentations provide opportunities for peer-to-peer learning.
Didactic Presentation	Didactic presentations are brief, easily digestible presentations provided during Clinics by a subject matter expert. Didactic presentations are intended to share best practices and new developments in the field.

ECHO CLINIC STRUCTURE

Each TeleECHO Clinic is facilitated by Action Alliance staff and includes the following components:

15 MINUTES	Welcome and Introductions: Individuals in each spoke site introduce themselves.
45 MINUTES	Case Presentation: A staff member from one of the spoke sites will provide a brief overview of their case. Clinic participants will ask clarifying questions and provide feedback to the case presenter.
25 MINUTES	Didactic Presentation: A subject matter expert will provide a brief training related to best practices in sexual and intimate partner violence primary prevention and peer education programs.
5 MINUTES	Closing Announcements: Action Alliance staff will provide closing announcements related to future Clinics and evaluations.

Each section of a Clinic follows the ECHO model, which means that facilitators ask for participation from those who are on video first, phone second, and then those who are in person at the Action Alliance last. We invite everyone, including our didactic presenters, to participate in the case presentation process. Please speak up as you feel comfortable in asking clarifying questions or providing recommendations.
